Greetings from Regina FD!

As we wrap up our 3rd year as a full UGME campus, our faculty continue to grow and develop! Regina is now home to several graduates of the M.Ed. (HPE) and Clinician Educator programs. Many of our faculty have stepped forward enthusiastically into new roles in UGME and PGME. Regina faculty can connect with their provincial C.E. program peers through the regular T-Time meetings – special thanks for the generosity and hospitality of those who have hosted these sessions in their own homes!

Our SAGE (Skilled Academic Generalist Educators) program continues, with its 12 generalist physicians teaching over 600 hours in 2024-25, while also devoting time to improving their own teaching and learning needs through the online SAGE and FD Canvas courses. The SAGE online course modules are accredited for Mainpro and MOC credits, including a new OSCE Remediation module this year, built in collaboration with the Academic Support Team. SAGE faculty also participate in the PROMPT-Med (Peer Observation and Mentorship Program for Teaching in Medicine) program. We are excited to see this program expanding to Saskatoon campus under the leadership of Dr. Leane Pask in July!

Regina Campus participated in RISE (Research, Innovation, and Scholarship in Education) online this year on Friday, June 13th, with Regina's own Dr. Ibraheem Othman co-chairing with Dr. Cathy MacLean. Faculty from both campuses helped with the planning committee, abstract reviews, and over 85 participants joined online for a full day of learning and connecting. Thanks to all the staff and faculty from both campuses whose hard work and energy put together a fun and successful celebration of local medical education research!

We work closely with the preclerkship UGME team, assisting with OSCE examiner orientation – this year, we moved to on-site orientation at both campuses. This has created a more engaged session, with lots of good questions and discussion. Examiners – thanks for being on time!

Supporting our faculty's wellness is essential – and we hope that opening the doors to mindful practice for our faculty will be part of that... more to come next year!

Vice Dean Faculty Engagement

We continue to strengthen our connection with faculty across the college, recognizing that faculty development is an important part of engaging faculty in the academic mission. A top priority remains ensuring that all faculty have equal access to high-quality teaching, research and leadership resources. When faculty feel supported, they are more engaged in their role and better equipped to thrive.

Over the past year, our teams, along with the dean and our educational leadership visited teaching sites throughout the province. These visits highlighted the range of teaching environments, gave us the opportunity to build meaningful relationships, and provided the opportunity to discuss what is working well and areas we can improve. We have listened to this feedback and worked closely with the Faculty Development team and other partners to identify and implement solutions.

The Faculty Development team has done an outstanding job tailoring programming and resources to meet the needs of our faculty through a variety of offerings such as conferences, workshops and online courses. Importantly, the team has ensured faculty are able to participate regardless of their location or schedule. A good example is the Research, Innovation and Scholarship in Education (RISE) conference, which was held virtually in June and saw strong participation from faculty across the province.

A focus continues to be welcoming new faculty and helping them feel a part of our academic community. Through individual meetings or group orientation, Faculty Engagement encourages all faculty to take advantage of this programming and encourage departments to actively promote these opportunities. These learning offerings are designed to help faculty grow as effective and innovative educators. We have been able to incorporate involvement in faculty development as part of academic promotion and advancement for medical faculty.

Finally, I would like to thank Dr. Cathy MacLean and the Faculty Development team for their incredible work. Their dedication ensures our faculty have the resources they need to be effective teachers, which positively impacts the learning experiences of our students.

Faculty Development continues to play a vital role in supporting our faculty as educators, scholars and leaders. I want to thank the Faculty Development team for another outstanding year of programming and events.

This year was marked by growth and several new initiatives. One of the highlights was the new online Orientation to Teaching for New Faculty course, which is designed to help new educators build confidence and teaching skills. The Faculty Development team also hosted the first SaskSimSummit event, dedicated to best practices in health care simulation, along with in-person Simulation FUNdamentals workshops across the province.

Faculty Development's ongoing programs continue to have strong participation, a reflection of the team's dedication to timely and relevant programming. The Timely Topics in Medical Education (T-TIME) webinar series remains popular, offering a new theme each month. This series is part of the Clinician Educator Diploma Program and provides high-quality learning led by experts here in the province. We are also seeing continued interest in the Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion and Unconscious Bias courses, which helps faculty strengthen their understanding of these important topics.

Faculty Development also improved access to timely and popular training presentations through on-demand videos. Hosted on the college's YouTube channel, these videos cover topics like effective feedback, facilitation, and unconscious bias. New videos are posted every month.

In June, the Faculty Development team hosted the eighth annual Research, Innovation and Scholarship in Education (RISE) event. The virtual format made the event more accessible to attendees in rural areas. This was a great opportunity to celebrate the range of research and scholarship in medical education across Saskatchewan. A special highlight was a keynote address from Dean Dr. Sarah Forgie.

Looking ahead, we are excited about the upcoming launch of the New Faculty Micro-Research initiative later this year. This program will provide faculty with a practical and accessible way to engage in research that addresses real-world challenges in their communities.

Finally, we are proud to recognize several faculty members who received national awards this year: Drs. Kelsey Brose, Joelle McBain, and Andries Muller for the Canadian Association of Medical Education (CAME) Certificate of Merit Awards; Dr. Cathy MacLean for the Association of Faculties of Medicine of Canada (AFMC) Award for Outstanding Contribution to Faculty Development in Canada; Dr. Valerie Verge for the AFMC Scientist Award; and Dr. Puneet Kapur for the Royal College Award for Early Career Leadership in Health Policy/Health Systems.

My sincere appreciation to the Faculty Development team for their dedication and hard work throughout the year. Your work makes a difference and continues to positively impact medical education in our province.

Our programming was shaped by a deep commitment to responsiveness—listening to the evolving needs of our faculty, learners, and partners, and delivering timely, relevant, and impactful educational experiences.

This section highlights the breadth and depth of our offerings, which spanned foundational teaching skills, leadership development, equity, diversity and inclusion, and scholarly engagement. From the launch of new initiatives like **Simulation FUNdamentals**, to the continued success of **Unconscious Bias workshops** and **T-TIME sessions**, our work reflects a culture of adaptability and excellence.

We are especially proud of the inaugural SaskSimulation Summit, the expansion of asynchronous learning opportunities, and the record-breaking attendance at RISE 2025.

Responsive programming is not just about delivering sessions—it's about fostering connection, building capacity, and empowering educators to lead change. This section celebrates the creativity, collaboration, and care that define our approach to faculty development.

Core Programming

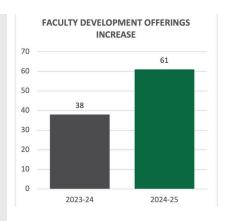
Core programming forms the foundation of Faculty Development's educational offerings, providing essential support for teaching excellence across the College of Medicine. This year, our flagship series—**Timely Topics in Medical Education (T-TIME)**—continued to anchor our programming, reaching over **175 participants** through monthly sessions featuring expert-led workshops and guest presentations. T-TIME remains a key component of the Clinician Educator Diploma Program and is open to everyone.

In collaboration with **Undergraduate Medical Education (UGME)**, we also delivered **biannual onboarding sessions** for new course and module directors. These sessions ensure that faculty are well-prepared to navigate their teaching roles and responsibilities with confidence and clarity.

A major enhancement this year was the launch of the **Orientation to Teaching for New Faculty course**. This asynchronous, Canvas-based offering supports new educators in developing effective teaching strategies for diverse learner groups—including medical students, residents, physician assistants, and other healthcare professionals. The course equips faculty with foundational knowledge and practical tools to mentor learners at all stages, fostering both professional growth and enriched learning experiences.

Together, these initiatives reflect our commitment to responsive, inclusive, and high-impact programming that supports faculty at every stage of their teaching journey.

Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (EDI) remain central to the mission of Faculty Development at the College of Medicine. In 2024–25, our programming continued to foster awareness, reflection, and action across the medical education continuum.

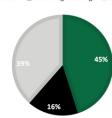
Our Unconscious Bias workshops were among the most requested offerings, engaging over 495 participants from departments and colleges across the province. These sessions addressed both general and context-specific topics, including the biological and sociocultural roots of bias, clinical decision-making, coaching and feedback, and admissions interviewing. The workshops created safe spaces for dialogue and learning, helping faculty and staff recognize and mitigate bias in their educational and clinical practices.

By integrating equity-focused content into core and specialized programming, Faculty Development continues to support a more inclusive and respectful learning environment—one that values diverse perspectives and promotes fairness in medical education.

Simulation & Innovation

Simulation-based education continues to be a cornerstone of innovation in Faculty Development. In 2024–25, we launched and expanded several initiatives that support educators in developing high-impact, experiential learning environments.

The **Simulation FUNdamentals** course, introduced in February 2024, provides healthcare educators with foundational knowledge in simulation design, delivery, and debriefing. With **over 70 participants enrolled** in the online Canvas course and **50 attending in-person workshops** across Saskatoon, Regina, Swift Current, and Melfort, this blended learning model has proven both accessible and effective.

We also hosted the inaugural **SaskSimulation Summit: Best Practices in Healthcare Simulation** on **January 31, 2025**. This virtual half-day event brought together **over 80 participants** from across the province, including simulation leaders, educators, and healthcare professionals. The summit featured plenary sessions, interactive workshops, and networking opportunities, fostering a vibrant community of practice and sparking new collaborations.

These initiatives reflect our commitment to advancing simulation pedagogy and supporting educators in delivering immersive, learner-centered experiences. Simulation & Innovation programming continues to evolve, offering faculty the tools and community needed to lead transformative educational practices.

Peer Support & Mentorship

Peer support and mentorship are foundational to Faculty Development, fostering collaboration, reflection, and continuous growth. In 2024–25, we strengthened these pillars through targeted programming that supports educators in developing their teaching practice through observation, feedback, and coaching.

The **PROMPT-MED** (PeeR Observation and Mentorship Program for Teaching in MEDicine) provides faculty with flexible, context-specific peer observation and feedback. Participants are matched with experienced educators and receive constructive, evidence-based input in a safe and supportive environment. Integrated into the SAGE initiative, PROMPT-MED strengthens teaching capacity province-wide.

Coaching Skills for Better Learning, facilitated by Dr. Marcel D'Eon and Sean Polreis, ran its first course from January to May 2025 with 14 participants. Focused on coaching-style feedback and debriefing, the course will return in Fall 2025 to continue supporting reflective teaching and learner development.

TIPS for Residents, a required PGME course for all first-year residents in Saskatchewan, introduces core teaching principles and encourages lifelong application. Guided by the TIPS Oversight Committee with Sean Polreis as Chair, the program evolves through continuous feedback and serves as a pathway to advanced programs like the Clinician Educator Diploma and Masters in Education.

Together, these programs reflect our commitment to cultivating a supportive teaching community—one that values mentorship, feedback, and shared learning.

Scholarship & Engagement

Faculty Development continues to champion scholarly engagement and innovation in medical education. In 2024–25, our programming provided platforms for educators, learners, and researchers to share their work, build networks, and celebrate excellence.

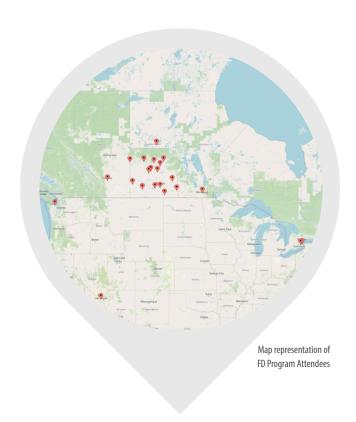
Map representation of Family Medicine Training Sites

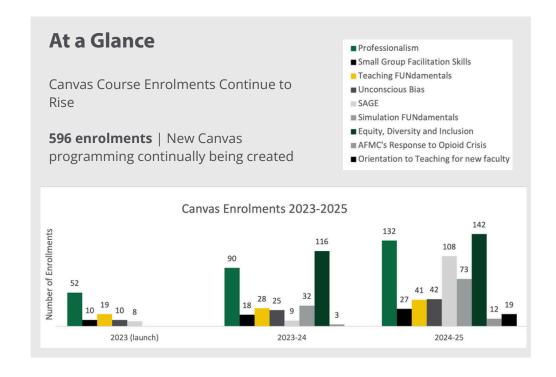
Online Programming

Since 2023, Faculty Development has focused on creating longitudinal programming on Canvas, allowing faculty to access courses asynchronously throughout the year. These courses address areas of need, including Professionalism, Professional Identity Formation and Ethics (132 enrolments); Small Group Facilitation Skills (27 enrolments); Teaching FUNdamentals (41 enrolments); Unconscious Bias (42 enrolments); SAGE (108 enrolments); Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (142 enrolments); Simulation FUNdamentals (73 enrolments); AFMC's Response to the Opioid Crisis (12 enrolments); and Orientation to Teaching for New Faculty (19 enrolments).

Courses continue to be developed, with future offerings including **Feedback** and **Clinical Teaching Tips**. We are excited to build on these initiatives throughout 2025 and are pleased to see a steady increase in enrolment over the past years. This work has involved numerous contributors, and we are very grateful for their efforts on behalf of Faculty Development. These programs are offered for free to all faculty, learners, and staff.

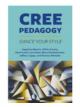

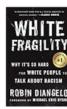


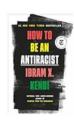

Master of Physician Assistant Studies Program

A New Era for Healthcare Education

Welcome to a new chapter in the history of the College of Medicine! The Master of Physician Assistant Studies (MPAS) program goes beyond being just another program for the College of Medicine, it is part of a transformative change in the healthcare landscape for Saskatchewan.

Physician Assistants (PAs) are highly skilled clinicians who practice in collaboration with a supervising physician. They can perform a wide range of clinical tasks and procedures and are integral members of multidisciplinary health teams. PAs extend the reach of physicians, within their specific scope of practice determined by their supervising physician. Their team-based approach inherently strengthens interprofessional relationships, leading to more cohesive and effective patient care.

The USASK MPAS program aims to foster excellence and innovation in education, research and clinical practice and to become a national leader in these areas. This two-year full-time, rigorous, and fast-paced competency-based graduate program is designed to prepare highly skilled Physician Assistants (PAs) who will play a vital role in collaborative healthcare teams, enhancing access to services and improving patient care across Saskatchewan.

Emphasizing equity, diversity, inclusion, accessibility, and Indigenous (EDIAI) values, the MPAS program is dedicated to providing equitable access to education for all. Aligned with the College of Medicine's commitment to social accountability, we aim to significantly increase the representation of Saskatchewan residents, especially those from underserved and rural communities, to address local healthcare needs and promote a diverse range of perspectives within our academic community. Learning alongside and from other health sciences students will strengthen these vital interprofessional relationships, supporting stronger, more team-based healthcare in the workplace.

Our Journey This Past Year: MPAS & Faculty Development Synergies

The past year has been a period of intense foundational work and exciting progress for the MPAS program as we look to launch the program in August 2025. We have been blessed to have a strong partnership with the Faculty Development team and Dr. Scott Tunison has been the glue between both spheres. Proactively engaging with the Faculty Development unit has been crucial to support our faculty through this immense change now and into the future. We recognize that the success of the MPAS program hinges on the expertise and commitment of our faculty – we would not be able to do any of this without their support. Over the past year, our collaboration has focused on:

• **Curriculum Development Support**: Faculty Development has provided invaluable guidance and resources as we designed the intensive MPAS curriculum, ensuring pedagogical soundness and alignment with best practices in health professions education.

U S A S K M P A S

- Interprofessional Education (IPE) Integration: We've worked closely to embed IPE principles into the curriculum, leveraging existing faculty expertise in teambased learning to prepare PAs who can seamlessly integrate into diverse healthcare settings.
- Initial Faculty Orientation & Information Sessions: We've begun hosting preliminary sessions to introduce faculty to the PA role and the unique aspects of PA education, laying the groundwork for future teaching and supervisory roles.
- **Identifying Future Training Needs:** Through ongoing discussions, we've identified critical areas where existing faculty may benefit from targeted development to effectively teach, mentor, and supervise PA students, particularly given the distinct scope of practice and team-based nature of the PA profession.

This synergistic relationship has been instrumental in ensuring that as we build the MPAS program, we are simultaneously preparing our faculty for their vital role in shaping the next generation of healthcare providers.

Shaping Tomorrow's PAs: Upcoming Faculty Development OpportunitiesWorking with our Faculty Development team, we plan to expand our faculty development initiatives.

In the coming academic year (2025-2026), we plan to:

- Targeted PA-Specific Didactic Training: Develop and deliver workshops and resources specifically designed to equip faculty with the knowledge and skills required to teach MPAS students effectively. This will include understanding the PA scope of practice, interprofessional roles, and the unique didactic requirements of the curriculum.
- Clinical Preceptor Development: A key area of focus will be preparing faculty clinicians to serve as preceptors for MPAS students during their clinical rotations. This will involve training on effective clinical teaching, student assessment, and navigating the PA-physician supervisory relationship.
- **Interprofessional Teaching & Assessment:** Further expand opportunities for faculty to enhance their skills in facilitating interprofessional learning experiences, layered learning and assessing competency in team-based care.
- **Research Capstone Supervision Training:** Provide guidance for faculty interested in supervising the MPAS students' research capstone projects, aligning with the program's commitment to fostering research excellence.
- **Information Sessions and Networking Events:** Continue to host sessions that provide updates on the program's progress, introduce new faculty to the PA concept, and foster a community of practice around PA education.

We encourage all faculty members to look out for these upcoming opportunities and consider how their expertise can contribute to the success of this new program. Your engagement will be crucial in preparing PAs who will make a tangible difference in patient care across Saskatchewan.

Clinician Educator Diploma Program

The Clinician Educator (CEd) Diploma Program continues to grow as a cornerstone of faculty development within the College of Medicine. As of June 2025, the program has:

25 faculty members currently participating, with 23 based in Saskatoon and 2 in Regina. These participants represent 8 of the 14 College of Medicine departments:

• Anesthesiology, Emergency Medicine, Family Medicine, Medicine, Pediatrics, Pathology, Psychiatry, and Surgery.

6 fellows have graduated from the program:

- 5 from Saskatoon (departments: Psychiatry, Family Medicine, Anesthesiology, and Surgery)
- 1 from Regina (Family Medicine)

34 fellows currently enrolled, including the incoming 2025 cohort.

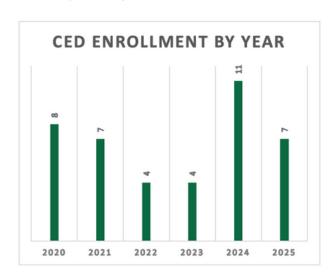
• Among these, 7 are senior residents, while the remainder are faculty members.

Fellows have come from **10 of the 14 College of Medicine departments**, including:

 Anesthesiology, Emergency Medicine, Family Medicine (including EM & Sports Medicine), Medicine (Gastroenterology, Infectious Disease, Internal Medicine, Neurology, Cardiology), Obstetrics & Gynecology, Pathology & Lab Medicine, Pediatrics, Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation, Psychiatry, and Surgery.

The program aims to include fellows from all departments across training sites throughout Saskatchewan, fostering province-wide educational leadership.

Most fellows are actively involved in educational leadership roles, serving as clerkship and program directors, and coordinators for pre-clerkship and residency training.

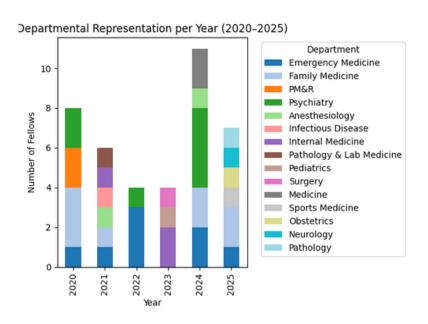

Masters in Health Professions Education

Launched in Fall 2021, the program continues to grow, emphasizing interprofessional communication, teaching, and learning.

This online program is designed for health professionals seeking to enhance their teaching practices, leadership skills, and curriculum design expertise. The M.Ed. structure allows students to maintain full-time employment while completing coursework. Interdisciplinary courses integrate educational administration and curriculum studies within a health sciences context. The next intake will open for Spring and Fall 2026.

Enhanced Program Quality

To engage in ongoing and systematic evaluation of the process and impact of faculty development through reflective critique, quality improvement, educational innovation, and scholarly work.

Introduction

Faculty Development is actively advancing its strategic priorities through a commitment to excellence in educational programming, evaluation, and scholarship. Central to this effort is our alignment with the ASPIRE criteria, an international standard established by the Association for Medical Education in Europe (AMEE) that recognizes outstanding achievement in medical, dental, and veterinary education. Our team is continually refining evaluation methods to meet these high standards and ensure meaningful impact.

Our programming spans both the College of Medicine and departmental levels, offering **formally accredited study credits** through monthly core sessions and asynchronous online modules hosted on **Canvas**. In collaboration with the **Division of Continuing Medical Education (CME)**, we successfully secured **Maintenance of Certification (MOC)** and **Mainpro+** credits, delivering a total of **92 accredited hours** in the 2024–25 academic year.

Beyond educational delivery, Faculty Development is deeply engaged in **research and scholarship**.
